We are sending you 500 0.3 gram (base) tablets of chloro-
quine (SN-7618) (aralen) and if you should need an additional
supply, I shall be glad to send it along. *Some literature will be
packed with the drug.*

The Bureau of Prisons has agreed to send you some current
literature, I hope it has already gone, and to put you on the
mailing list for monthly publications.

I saw Doctor Parran on Friday and he wanted to know if
I had had a chance to visit your project. Since the answer
was yes, he asked me to tell him about it and I did so to the

and wanted to be brought up to date on what progress had been
made. As you well know, he is very much interested in the
project and a merry twinkle came into his eye when he said,

investigative work in that country that I find it hard to get
